

Since the federal government declared COVID-19 a public health emergency in 2020, we have all experienced challenges navigating the daily life we call "normal." Let's take a look at how some of those challenges impacted Cowley County.

Bivalent vaccines were introduced, granting protection from two COVID-19 variants.

April:

Cowley County experienced a record-low number of cases reported in a single month (44) since the onset of the pandemic.

The Federal COVID-19 Public Health **Emergency Declaration officially** ended.

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





MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH


In 2023, the healthcare system in Cowley County experienced a reduction in services, particularly for pregnant and postpartum women.

MCH Program staff reached a record high for services provided in 2023!











REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH





ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES BY YEAR






Zoonotic diseases are illnesses that can spread from animals to people. When someone is bitten by an animal, the Health Department works with local law enforcement and medical professionals to investigate the incident and provides guidance on what to do next.

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LEAD POISONING PREVENTION

Lead poisoning in children causes lifelong health impacts such as brain damage. Testing is the only way to identify lead poisoning. Children are most commonly exposed to lead in older homes.

"Cowley County children aged 0-5 years are at high risk for lead poisoning due to the abundance of families living in older homes that were built prior to 1960, when leadbased surface coatings were commonly used in residential properties." -Thomas Langer, Cowley County Public Health Officer



CHILDCARE FACILITY LICENSING

This program guarantees that Cowley County daycares comply with state regulations to protect the health and safety of children in attendance. In the county, a shortage of providers who will accept infants exists.

COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT & COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN


The Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is a strategic process to collect data from residents about their perceptions of the community resources that impact health. The next CHNA will kick off in the spring of 2024. The data is used to develop a three-year improvement plan called the Community Health Improvement Plan.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health is assembled by nine appointments made from local governing bodies. The Cowley County Commission appoints three at large members, one physician, and one dentist. The cities of Arkansas City and Winfield each appoint one member. Unified School District Boards #462 and #471 each appoint one member. Once appointed, members of the Board serve three-year terms. The Board annually elects a Chair and Vice-Chair in January. The Health Department's Administrator serves at the pleasure of the Board as Secretary-Treasurer. A Licensed Physician is contracted to serve as a Medical Consultant to advise the Public Health Officer/Administrator on medical matters. The Board maintains two offices, one in Winfield and another in Arkansas City.






FINANCIAL REPORTS

In 2024, we will prepare for our annual budgetary audit to ensure that our financial practices align with accepted accounting principles for governmental entities and public law. We do not expect any issues since we regularly submit state-required reports and provide accounting reports to the Joint Board of Health (JBOH). The JBOH frequently reviews our fiscal status to ensure that our operations meet the requirements of our clients and local, state, and federal governments.
