
### World Breastfeeding Week

# **COVID & ILLNESS REPORT**

July has seen an extreme increase in COVID cases within the county with more cases than the previous 4 months combined! July is second only to January in active viral transmission. A total of 517 cases have been recorded as of July 29th.

We urge the public to take all necessary precautions to prevent the spread of illness. This sharp rise in cases could prove extremely dangerous to the most
